Wisconsin QSO Party

The due date for log submissions has passed. 334 logs were received, up 20% over last year. There were 158 in Wisconsin, 176 outside Wisconsin with 48,000 + entries. 11 rovers covered 40 counties and only Crawford and Richland counties were not activated. 36 clubs were represented, 8 out of state operators were operating from within Wisconsin, and 139 DX calls were logged. Dane, Milwaukee, and Waukesha counties were most active.

FREE COAX

Over the past couple of months, WARAC has been the recipient of a considerable amount of coax cable and several antennas. If you are in need of some jumper coax cables or coax for your antenna, please continue reading.

At the present time, we have a large bundle of "jumper size" coax with PL-259, type N or the combination of both connectors on these cables. I will be bringing these jumper coax cables to the May 14th general meeting. Please help yourself to these cables as they are free for the taking. Field Day 2013 By Chuck Dellis, W9WLX

Planning for Field Day 2013 is underway! The initial Field Day meeting took place on April 30th and the West Allis Radio Amateur Club is on its way to another successful event.

Field Day will take place at the New Berlin location, 3711 S. Casper Drive, as it has the past two years. The terrain, location, and the presence of mature trees are a definite plus. The club will be operating in the 2A category with a "free" (3rd) VHF station. All stations will be accommodated in pop-up campers, providing an above average level of operator comfort.

Set up, tear down, and operating logistics still need to be determined, so be sure to watch for updates in Hamtrix and on the WARAC website. Additionally, a sign up sheet will be circulated at the May 14 and June 11 club meetings. Otherwise, contact Chuck Dellis, W9WLX, and let him know what your interest is. Field Day has been a well attended, fun, event so let's keep the tradition going in 2013!

FEMA courses. (Federal Emergency Management Agency)

I volunteered to go to the Boy Scout Jamboree this summer. One of the prerequisites is to take a couple of FEMA courses on incident management.

Much to my surprise I found them interesting! They prove to me that it is even possible for the government to learn from their mistakes. A lot of this was developed from some of the botched disaster relief that the government has done.

Since we Ham radio operators have the possibility of actually participating in disasters I thought I would share my thoughts on the courses along with the web sites if you are interested in looking at them.

FEMA has a recommended command structure for any size incident. It recommends one person is in charge and takes on all responsibility. This person should be the best qualified for the job not necessarily the highest rank. With a small incident the person in charge and the workers may be all that is needed. As the incident grows the command structure can grow under the person in charge. So there is a whole structure that can grow as needed.

Some of the interesting thing I found in the courses were:

1. All communication should be in plain English. You have multiple disciplines involved (fireman, police, ham radio operators, etc.) each with their own short cuts for communication. The only common language is English.

2. They suggest that it is wise to have everyone involved report to a staging area to be assigned where to go. That way everyone is kept track of and used where needed most.

3. I was surprised that part of the Logistics command job was not only getting stuff for supporting the operation but, from the beginning, planning how to get the stuff that is not used back to save money and have it ready for the next incident .

There is a lot more in the courses! Both the ones I took were three hours long, including a test. The test gives you a diploma so you can prove you took the courses. But you can sample the courses as you like.
