ANNOUNCEMENTS

Silent Key – Howard mentioned the nice article in Hamtrix. He asked for any membership comments. Ron Gorski, N9AU, mentioned that he was there when the picture published in HT, with George overlooking the students, was taken. He remembers those sessions being up to 40 kids at one time. George would hang around until all the questions were answered.

WAS Contest – Howard asked for progress reports. John, K9IAC, said he was two short, while George, AA9SR, said he had two. Tom Macon told the membership that the forms needed to participate were on a table at this meeting.

WIQP – Lynn mentioned that he was just finishing up with data entry for the electronic logs. The projected total today, including paper logs, is about 290, which is a new record. He plans to finish entry soon, get the results assembled, and report to the Board at the May Board meeting. Results should be on our website by early June or before. He indicated that at this point, it looked like we might have two new winners that had never won before.

PROGRAM

RF Exposure Calculations - Tom Wensch, N9HR, went thru his PowerPoint presentation on how to determine your RF Exposure Compliance, as required by the FCC. Five points were covered –

1. Recording the station operating parameters;

2. Exclusion based on power output;
3. Exclusion based on mode(s) of operation;
4. Exclusion based on exposure distances; and
5. Recording methods to achieve compliance.

He went thru actual numbers, based on his specific station and antennas. Tom presented the club with a CD copy of the presentation, for the club to put on the club website, or make available to members. Tom also handed out paper copies of the presentation, for those who wanted them.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:15 PM, followed by refreshments and eyeball QSO's.

**Minutes of the Board Meeting
May 26, 2009**

The meeting was called to order at 7:09 PM. by Chairman Howard Smith.

Board members present were: Charles Craven, George Dunco, Tom Macon, Howard Smith, Lynn Tamblyn and Dick Wood.

Audit Of Club Books – Some issues still remain before the 2007 audit can be completed. An additional meeting of the Committee will be scheduled.

Wisconsin QSO Party - Lynn reported that he has completed data entry, and is going to start the assembly work, once he completes work on his final double and triple checks. He then went thru a number of items for the Board., including how WARAC did overall. Lastly, he handed out a copy of the Soapbox Comments, to give the Board a flavor of the event. He is aware of two records being broken. 290 logs have been entered, which is a gain of 8 percent over last year, which he attributes to the ARRL Year of the QSO Party event happening this year. He hopes to have the final results completed by mid June.

Field Day – Tom led a lengthy discussion regarding “training.” The Board was not sure if they should do training just for Field Day or if the training should be more complete, such as training for those interested in

WARAC IN WIQP 2009

So how did we do? In a nutshell, we set a new record for the best WARAC total score ever, and we matched our best ever position amongst standings in the Wisconsin Club Competition. This was done with ten members participating, with all ten entering the Single Operator Fixed (SOF) category, the most popular category in WIQP each year.

Our best previous high score was in 2005, achieving 207,604.5 points, scored by nine club members. This year, with ten members entering, we achieved 214,368 points, which is about 3 percent better than 2005. The ten are: Ron Gorski, N9AU; Phil Gural, W9NAW; Tom Macon, K9BTQ; Charles Craven, WB9PUB; John Zach, K9IAC; Lynn Tamblyn, K9KR; Howard Smith, WA9AXQ; John Westimayer, N9LGD; George Dunco, AA9SR; and Ron Crown, KA9JCP.

This year WARAC achieved sixth position, out of 29 clubs that entered in the competition. You have to go way back to 1997 to equal that sixth place position, when 24 clubs entered, so in reality, we actually did better in the club competition, too, than in 1997. However, sixth is still sixth.

As I said before, Single Operator Fixed is our most popular entry category. This year we had 107 total entries. As a point of information, the top scoring SOF entry this year scored 129,060 points.

Below I have listed the specific information for each of them, to give you a better flavor of their effort, with the *Place* being how they ended up related to the 107 total entries.

DAYTON 2009—SOME HIGHLIGHTS

Paul Bittner, W0AIH, became the 2009 inductee into the *CQ Contest Hall of Fame* at this year's Dayton Hamvention. Paul's 120 acre farm near Eau Claire has grown a huge variety of towers and antennas over the last 20-plus years. Perhaps you've seen it off to the east as you approach Eau Claire from the south on I-90. Paul has also been actively seeking out and training new testers and is well known around the world. In the Wisconsin QSO Party and other contests, his station is often heard as W9EAU.



In the picture above, Paul and XYL Mary do their American Gothic impression. Check out his “crop” in the background. Paul was the guest speaker at one of our Awards Dinners in the 1980's where he put on a very interesting program. As I recall, he said he had 54 towers at that time.

Shown at above right is Paul with Sean Kutzko, KX9X, ARRL Contest Branch Manager at Dayton. Here are Sean's comments from his Dayton blog on the ARRL website.

“Of course, the highlight of the [Contest Banquet] was seeing Reverend Paul Bittner, W0AIH, get inducted into

the *CQ Contest Hall Of Fame*. W0AIH's Wisconsin antenna farm is legendary, and at 75, Paul is still adding more towers. He is one of contesting's elder statesmen, a modest gentleman, and has given back a lot to the contesting community over the years. He is deserving of such a great honor. Congratulations, Paul.”



Congratulations to Paul from WARAC as well.

On another Dayton note, the Kansas City DX Club's CW Pileup contest again attracted 111 participants and plenty of attention. Former WARAC member Doug Smith, W9WI, came in with 49 calls copied, second to VE3DZ's 51. Noteworthy also is that Alex, VE3NEA's improved CW Skimmer program copied 61 calls, 10 ahead of the top human. Skimmer copied 31 calls last year. See last June's Hamtrix article about Dayton 2008, Skimmer and W9WI.

The sponsoring Kansas City DX Club has a web page with Doug's tips for competing in the CW Pileup contest. www.kcdxclub.com/w9wi.html. In addition to some good serious tips, he comments on the effect of blood alcohol level on his performance, “I have a gut feeling (but no statistics) to suggest a modest correlation between blood alcohol and Pileup Competition score. Over the years, I've done it 100% sober; I've done it with enough in the system to get a state trooper's attention; and I've done it with just one beer. I seem to do best in the latter case. I might guess that one beer relaxes the inhibition against guessing when logging calls. Might there be a similar correlation between blood alcohol and UBN (logging error) rate?”

“I don't think there's any correlation between score and brand of beer. However, as a loyal Milwaukeean who has yet to forgive the Cardinals for winning the 7th game of the 1984 World Series, I believe any entrant found to be drinking a Budweiser should be disqualified.”

Note that the Pileup contest is conducted in the evening in a hotel hospitality suite where a certain amount of alcohol consumption no doubt takes place.

meeting place. The class will last no more than 1½ hours and will cover contesting fundamentals and some contesting strategy. Be sure to put this date and time on your calendar.

The class will not be limited to Field Day contesting – it will cover contesting basics that can be used in any contest. Even if you can't make Field Day itself, you're more than welcome to attend the class.

The second training phase, of course, is to put what was learned in the Tuesday class into practice during Field Day. Trainees will be paired with "mentors" to guide them and further their learning experience, OJT style (On the Job Training). If the 6-meter band is open, trainees will spend some time at the VHF station. At the HF stations, trainees will begin by logging for another operator. This provides excellent practice with the N3FJP logging program plus experience listening to the mentor/operator and logging his QSO's.

The final step is to take the mike. At this point, it's normal for most new ops to have some butterflies, but there's no need to be nervous. You really can't embarrass yourself and you can't break anything. Nobody will be upset if you goof up, either on the air or in the shack. There's nothing to worry about – just take your time and wade in.

In order to make the one-on-one pairing of mentors with trainees work, we will need some kind of schedule, but this will be tricky. Variables such as weather, band conditions and when individuals can be on-site make scheduling difficult. I will be asking trainees and men-

tors when they can be on-site and lay out a schedule based on that information, then hope that we don't need to make too many changes on the fly.

Practice is essential to develop contesting skills so, in order to get maximum benefit from the Field Day opportunity, trainees should plan to spend several hours operating.

If you are interested in knowing more about contesting, here's your chance. It's challenging and fun (nobody would do it if it weren't) so get on board! Please contact me (Tom, K9BTQ) if you want to participate and haven't already let me know. See the masthead at the bottom of page 2 for contact information. And please note that **our FD training is open to anyone** – not just WARAC members.

This year's Field Day setup will look similar to recent years - two HF stations plus the "free" VHF station. Mike Wagner, N9ESC, will set up his camper and station and primarily handle 40-meter phone and CW. His antenna will be a dipole or G5RV supported by two of the club's masts.

The 75/20 station will use a rotatable antenna, probably the DAP rotary dipole for 20m, 15m and 10m plus a 75-meter broadbanded dipole based on an article in July 1995 QST magazine. This station will be housed in Jackie Jurek's motor home as it was last year.

Be sure to attend the upcoming meeting on Tuesday to learn the details of the FD training and also to get in on the final planning of the whole event. Also, there will be pictures and videos of Field Days past. CU there!

learning how to participate in contests. Discussions were held on how many "students" there would be, trainers and mentors, and what the process of training should be – i.e. a classroom type of training and then "on the job" training (such as during FD) OR training spread over a longer period of time. The general conclusion(s) of the Board was to do longer term training, for those interest in learning contesting, which the Board feels would help provide additional contesting members, both for future Field Day operations and Wisconsin QSO Party participation, as well as other contests the club membership would participate in, such as the Worked All States challenge that the club is presently doing.

Programs - The June program will be about Field Day. July will bring a program on the national VEC by Tom Fuszard, KF9PU. Logbook of the World (LOTW), by

Brian Cieslak, K9WIS, will be presented for our August meeting. A program on the Buddipole system was suggested.

Repeater – Howard told the Board that the repeater is experiencing problems, and that he had shut it off. He will investigate the problem as soon as possible. Discussion then began on the concern about how long it is taking to move the system to another location, OR, as to whether the club needs a repeater. The Board decided the membership should speak to the repeater. Howard will discuss this with the membership at the next meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:00 PM.
