FIELD DAY 2010 IS HISTORY

With our emphasis on operator training for this second year, our Field Day scores are not what they were in previous years. This year we accumulated a total of 668 QSO's, down from 745 in 2009. But there's another important measure that relates to our operator training mission – number of visitors.



Four recently licensed hams participated, most of whom were also at our Basic Contesting Class on the Tuesday before FD. They were Terry Schima, KC9SMT, husband/wife team Dean and Darlene Berglund, KC9REN and KC9SBN, respectively, and Jim Kehoss, KC9RNY. In addition, two of last year's trainees, Brian Ganiere, KC9LYZ, and Jeff Tamblyn, KC9NPZ, (Lynn's son) joined us again this year. All-in-all, visitors accounted for 117 QSO's, about 18% of our total.

We were also visited by several other distinguished guests. They included Red Cross representative Tom Barnum, KC9ALL; Milwaukee-Florida Net member Dick Klein, N9CM, and past club members Floyd Urbanski, AB9EX; Les Hundt, AB9EY; Dave Garnier, WB9OWN; and Doug Awe, N9VA. N9CM hails from Beaver Dam and is now retired in the Tampa, Florida area. He was visiting family in the area and stopped by to check out our FD operation.

This year we again fielded two HF stations and a VHF station, as we have in recent years. The 75/20/10 meter station used the DAP tri-band rotary dipole and two criss-crossed inverted V's for 75 meters. This station was set up in an RV belonging to John, N9LGD, and it contributed 397 Q's to our total count.

The 40/15-meter station was again located in Mike, N9ESC's camper. Antennas were an Alpha-Delta multi-band dipole and a second DAP that was used on 15 meters. This station contributed 206 Q's.

The VHF station was set up in a tent supplied by Frank, WA9FZR, and was located near the larger food tent. This station operated on 6-meters and contributed 65 QSO's to the totals. Conditions were fairly good this year, with 6-meters, 10-meters and 15-meters showing activity.

Weather was good on Saturday for setup, though a bit warm. A late afternoon lake breeze kicked in and made the evening quite com-

As you can see, we have had some good years and some not so good years, and a few in between.

What a difference a year makes. Last year WARAC scored our highest ever accumulated score total as part of the annual Wisconsin Club Competition part of the Wisconsin QSO Party that your club has sponsored since 1979. Ten members pooled their scores for a 214,368-point total.

As you can see from the last line of the table (a sort of sneak preview), WARAC did not do as well this year. The overall score total was down from the last two years, and we dropped to 10th place overall in Club Competition. The better news is that we did a pretty decent score total with only 8 members.

This year I was kind of disappointed, as I reported to the Board at a past monthly meeting. I only found 8 members that sent in logs. I did see other club member calls in the logs of WIQP participants, but never got an entry from them. I wonder why? They participate and do not enter? I thought our members would be proud to be part of the club that sponsors such a popular event each year for the last 31 years.

Since this article is about WARAC participation, I will move on to the second item - to talk about individual efforts by those 8 club members that did enter.

Of the 176,908.5 points total WARAC had, the first 52,200 points came from the entry of K9BTQ, Tom Macon, who ran an amplifier this year, I believe for the first time ever? The amp put him into the HIGH power class. However, it really helped him do a lot better. He did a Single Operator entry, making 454 phone Qs, 34 CW Qs, and 100 multipliers, consisting of 54 WI counties, 43 states and 3 Canadian Provinces. That puts him in first place among those 8 club members. Congrats, Tom.

The next 38,880 points came from WB9PUB, Chuck Craven. He did a low power entry in the Single Operator category, making 324 phone Qs, with 44 WI counties, 35 states and one Canadian Province, for 80 multipliers.

The next 37,560 points came from W9NAW, Phil Gural, also a low power Single Operator entry. Phil did 313 phone Qs, and 80 multipliers also, consisting of 49 WI counties, 30 states and one Canadian Province.

The next 24,664.5 points came from W9WLX, Chuck

Dellis. Chuck deviated from the pack, so to speak, in that he submitted a low power single-op entry in the new Beginner category, since Chuck is new to contesting. His BEG entry was one of seven received. Chuck did 137 phone Qs and 62 CW Qs, with 63 multipliers consisting of 44 WI counties, 18 states and one Canadian Province.

Next up is yours truly, who also deviated from the pack. Number 3 son is Jeff, KC9NPZ. I had been talking with him about joining up and doing a low power mobile entry. Plans gelled. We loaded up his van with HF and VHF antennas and radios. Our plan was to do 14 to 15 counties, going up along the west side of Lake Winnebago, over the top, and down the east side. Time ran out. We only did nine. We parked and I operated HF while he did VHF. Then while we drove to the next stop, I did the VHF part to keep a signal on the air. It was quite an experience, and one I would recommend to all. Anyway, we entered the Multi Operator Multi Transmitter Mobile category, doing 176 phone Qs and 9 CW Qs. We managed to work 32 WI counties, nine states and one Canadian Province, for 42 multipliers. Oh yes, we did 16,155 points of the club total. And if you never did a mobile trip, it is way too much fun not to try.

Next on the list with 4,051.5 points is George Dunco, AA9SR, as a Single Operator low power entry. He had 73 phone Qs, with 29 WI counties, and 8 states, for a 37 multiplier total.

Howard Smith, WA9AXQ, was also a low power Single Operator entry. His 65 phone Qs and a multiplier total of 33, broken down as 25 WI counties, 7 states and one Canadian Province, earned him 3,217.5 points of the WARAC total.

Dave Engelmann, WB9GZP, earned the final 180 points of the club total, also as a low power Single Operator entry. He did 15 phone Qs, with 4 WI counties, three states and one Canadian Province, for an 8-multiplier total.

We all need to congratulate all of our club WIQP Club Competition entrants. Perhaps next year we will find a lot more of our club members who choose to participate. WIQP is a lot of fun, and only seven hours long. It really does seem like it is over almost before it gets started, but in those seven hours, the top participants are doing up to 100 contacts an hour. Try it. You will like it. And then send in your entry. C U in 2011 WIQP.
